"But seek first the Kingdom and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added to you. Therefore do not be anxious for tomorrow will take care of itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own" (Matthew 6:33-34).

I take great comfort in these two verses and I also praise God that He does equip us to handle the trials of life. ## Danby Community Church Administrative Council Meeting April 10, 2023.

**Present.** Pastor Ed Enstine, Sheila Enstine, Charlene Testut, Paula Nelson, Gloria Miller, and David McDermitt. Pastor Ed opened with prayer at 7:00 pm.

<u>CLERK'S MINUTES</u>. No March meeting, so February meeting minutes considered - motion to accept (Gloria), second (Sheila). Carried.

FINANCIAL SEC'Y REPORT: March report: motion to accept (Sheila), second (Gloria). Carried.

**TREASURER REPORT:** Regarding NYSEG, we will read our own meter to compare to bill. Motion to approve (Charlene), second (Gloria). Carried.

#### **OLD BUSINESS.**

- 1. Continuing the church's affiliation process with the 4C's, Paula, as Administrative Council Chair, signed the application contract for affiliation.
- 2. Finishing up the renaming of our ExxonMobil stock certificates from Danby Federated Church to Danby Community Church, Sheila and Ed will mail in the certificates to have name updated.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

- Genealogy request received from Mary Ann Barr, the Danby town historian. This will be sent to Lynn to check membership/baptism rolls
- Adopt-a-highway. Form received from highway department to renew 2-year contract for 2023-2025. Decision was made to accept 2-year commitment. Dave will send in form.
- Noise ordinance. There is concern about how a new Town law regarding noise might affect the church. The
  Council agreed that the law as currently written is not concrete enough that problematic noise isn't defined
  well and, in general, the law was neither conceived nor written properly. Sheila will draft a letter to send to the
  Town explaining this.
- Chicken & biscuit dinner planned for this Friday, April 14th.
- Frank Payton's memorial service this Sunday, 4/16, at 3:30 in the Sanctuary. Pastor Ed is not officiating but will check sound.
- Suggestion to put calendar announcements back onto the sanctuary overhead screen after service so that people can see them as a reminder when leaving and to use dark backgrounds so writing can be seen more easily via the projector.

#### Hospitality.

- A new Danby Food Pantry Agreement with the Town assures that money/funds go directly to the food bank and not the church. Charlene will sign this. Motion to approve agreement (Paula), Second (Sheila), Passed.

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- Chicken and biscuit dinner as mentioned above, Friday, April 14th.
- There is an upcoming Women's Tea planned at the church. The Council agreed to provide \$200 to support this ministry event.

**Spiritual Development.** The church is in the season of Eastertide which lasts 50 days until Pentecost and includes Ascension Thursday.

### **Spiritual Development Update from Sheila Enstine**

#### **Important Dates for May 2023:**

Eastertide, also known as the Great 50 Days, began with Resurrection Sunday on April 9<sup>th</sup> and includes Ascension Day, celebrating Christ's ascension into heaven. Ascension Day is 40 days from Christ's resurrection, so it is always on a Thursday, this year May 18<sup>th</sup>. We will celebrate Christ's ascension on the following Sunday, May 21<sup>st</sup>.

Ten days after Christ's Ascension we celebrate Pentecost, the anniversary of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on Christ's disciples. Pentecost is on May 28th this year.

Forty days from the Resurrection to the Ascension plus 10 days from Ascension to Pentecost gives us 50 days – the Great 50 Days in the Christian calendar. The liturgical color for the 50 days is white, changing to red for Pentecost Sunday.

### Missions Report Judy and Dale Horton





# A VISIT WITH ELOISE PHINNEY

"Get up and get dressed, the house is on fire!"

Eloise Phinney was seven years old when she heard these alarming words in the middle of a frozen January night. She looked out of the car window as the family pulled away and saw fire come out of the house around the chimney. The house burned down, but despite the crisis she went to school that morning. By the time she arrived, everyone knew what had happened.


"We hard party lines in those days," she explains.

Telephone companies saved wiring costs by looping several phone subscribers on the same line. Anyone on the line could pick up their phone and hear someone else's conversation. This system worked fine in the 1930s and 40s, perhaps because technology isn't the biggest change Eloise has seen.

"The biggest change is that people aren't as nice as they should be," she says.

Good manners, kindness, and family togetherness were significant influences in Eloise's childhood. Because their home had burned down, the family had to split up for the two months it took to rebuild the house. Her mother and Eloise's sister Frannie stayed

with relatives on Titus Avenue in Ithaca and Eloise stayed with an uncle and his family in the Forest Home area.



On one of the President's Days in February, Eloise, her mother and sister went to see the rebuilt house. Eloise remembers looking at the new house and crying.

"What are you crying about?" her granddad asked.

"I don't want to leave," she said.

"Well you don't have to," her granddad told her. "This is home."

She and her family were home at last! They didn't have much furniture and slept in the dining room on two mattresses. "We didn't care, as long as we were together."

She also returned to her beloved one-room school house on Jersey Hill. The Forest Home School was nice, she re-



members, but just not the same as Jersey Hill, which she attended until 8<sup>th</sup> grade when she transferred to high school. "We had good teachers," she says and her favorite subject was reading. History was interesting, but she liked stories best. The most memorable was *Uncle Tom's Cabin*.

"It made me cry and I was so worried about Eliza crossing the river on all that ice. It opened my eyes to slavery." Her love of reading attracted her to her husband Charles Phinney. She was visiting a high school friend in Ithaca who had a cousin living across the street. The friend took Eloise to visit the cousin.

"They had a big table covered with all kinds of magazines. Of course they weren't McCalls or Women's Day, more like Rod and Gun and sports magazines that were common in those days. But I liked it that he liked to read."

Charles and Eloise were married in the church she grew up in, "the old Methodist Church on the corner." Her uncle and aunt had taken her to the Aurora Street Methodist Church in downtown Ithaca while she stayed with them. "The pipe organ was fascinating!" she remembers, but just not the same as her small family church.

"I guess I've always been a believer," she says, "and I think you could say that my mother was a true believer. She taught Sunday school and we said our prayers every night. It was very comforting."

Prayer has been a sustaining force for Eloise and her family, especially during another time of separation when her husband Charles was in the Navy.

"He was assigned to the Midway when it was brand new. He became a torpedo man because he was a mechanic." Fortunately, the war ended before the Midway was commissioned. Charles then moved to the Sampson Naval Training Station in Seneca County. Her husband was able to get leave from Sampson when their first son was born.

Although Eloise has spent the majority of her life in the small town of Danby, raising her three sons and working as a farmer's wife, she has also ventured out as a short-term missionary. She and her sister Frannie with several others from the Danby church traveled to the Redbird Mission in Kentucky.

"I didn't know much about the South or mission work. The schools needed much help. I helped carrying boards. What I liked best was meeting lots of different people from different places, but we all had the same goals." Then she chuckled and added, "It was really more like a vacation than work, but don't tell anybody."

As she approaches her centennial birthday, Eloise has a bit of advice for all of us—"We need to appreciate family and stay in touch."

"We need to all get together someday and have a lemonade shower...I don't know what a lemonade shower is. It just came to me."

Perhaps a lemonade shower is a good metaphor for Eloise's life. She's an expert in making lemonade out of lemons, sweetened with family, friends, and faith.
