MER! The sun has risen as far north as possible this year. Fifteen hours and 15 minutes, sunrise to sunset today. The longest day and the shortest night share this date. For the next six months, our daylight hours will decrease and our nights will extend by a few minutes every day. Such is the rhythm of our year.

Despite some uncertainty, seasonal cycles provide the comfort of predictably. In general, we know when to sow and when to harvest, when to bundle up against winter cold and when to dress for summer heat. As the Bible says in Ecclesiastes 3, "There is a time for all things under heaven."

The strange thing about humankind is that we often rebel against routine. Being normal and ordinary can be so dull. We seek out a tan in winter and almost sub-artic air conditioning in summer. Unlike the seasons that endlessly cycle, a life in Christ breaks the cycles of our selfish nature and continues to grow us as people who model holiness.

Spiritual Development Update from Sheila Enstine

Important Dates for July 2023:

We are in the season of Ordinary Time, from the Latin word ordinal, which means counted. Reflecting the agricultural season of growth, Ordinary Time is a season of spiritual growth extending from Trinity Sunday through Christ the King Sunday, November 26th this year. The liturgical color is green, symbolizing growth in Christ.

Adult Small Groups:

- **The Sunday morning group** is completing a study of the Old Testament history books Ezra, Nehemiah, and Esther. During the summer we will study the prophetic books of Ezekiel and Daniel. The class meets on Sundays at 8:45 am. Let Sheila Enstine know if you're interested.
- **The Wednesday night Praise and Fellowship** gathers at 7 pm with the praise team. After worship, we have a time of koinonia (sharing our faith) and prayer.
- The Thursday evening Bible Study begins at 7 pm. Pastor Ed is leading a study on the Gospel of Matthew.
- The Friday afternoon Women's Bible Study meets at 1:00 PM in the All Saints Room. During the summer months, this group will move to a monthly schedule. We plan on reading Phillip Keller's *Lessons from a Sheep Dog: A True Story of Transforming Love*. See Suzanne Walker for more information.

Nursery: The nursery is available every Sunday for babies and children through age five.

<u>Children's Church:</u> After the first set of worship music on Sundays, children ages 6 through 10 (about 5th grade) are welcome to attend Children's Church

FINANCIAL SECRETARY REPORT: Dave gave report. Payton family donation can go into general funds. Exxon-Mobil can't send us paper stock certificates as they're moved to digital. Pressure Washing By Sheila Enstine

"Consider it a sheer gift, friends, when tests and challenges come at you from all sides. You know that under pressure, your faith-life is forced into the open and shows its true colors. So don't try to get out of anything prematurely. Let it do its work so you become mature and well-developed, not deficient in any way" (James 1:2-4 The Message).



Sometimes our Lord uses object lessons to teach us the meaning of his Word. That is the case for me and the above passage from James. The object lesson is in the process of having our house painted.

After much perseverance, we found a house painter who charges a reasonable price (comparatively speaking), has good references, and is actually available. Before sealing the deal, we took a second walk around the house.

The painter explained that we'd need a pressue wash before scraping and painting (no surprise—it's been three decades since the last paint job). That could expose the need for additional work. We gave the okay. Then the pressure hit.

We knew that the stucco covering the brick exterior was flaking in several places, but once the high-pressure water hit them, chunks of plaster came off those areas. That means we'll need time-consuming stucco repair before any painting can begin.

Metaphors break down eventually, some sooner than others, but I believe there's a faith lesson in this pressue-washing event.

Before anyone begins something new – from a new job or career path to a new relationship to a new calling or ministry – that person will need preparation. This might include training, education, wise advice from others, and radical "house cleaning." By this I mean self-examination of habits, character, and conscience. Psalm 51 speaks to this:

"Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin!...Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; Wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow" (Ps. 51:2,7NIV).

How God performs his power washing varies from person to person. But we shouldn't be surprised when we're about to step out in obedience to God and we experience unanticipated challenges or the realization that we don't have all the resources needed. Too often we view these setbacks as opposition from the enemy or even signs that we should give up.

Instead, we need to see these challenges as gifts, situations that increase pressure in our lives, which in turn reveal flaws in need of our attention. This is the prep work needed before moving forward.

I like the way The Message puts it, "...your faith-life is forced into the open and shows its true colors. So don't try to get out of anything prematurely."

Where are you experiencing pressure in your life? Where are the challenges or setbacks? Perhaps these troubling areas are places where "the stucco fell off" – personal flaws that need repair before going forward in life.

Let's use this summer as a time of preparation for that new thing that our Lord is planning or for recommitment to a life calling.
