Spiritual Development Update

Important Dates for June 2023:

Beginning the day after Pentecost Sunday, the Church enters a time of spiritual growth known as Ordinary Time. Ordinary comes from the Latin word ordinal, meaning counted. We are counting the Sundays from Trinity Sunday, June 4th this year, to the last Sunday before Advent, Christ the King Sunday. The liturgical color changes from white for Trinity Sunday to green for the remainder of Ordinary Time. Green symbolizes growth in Christ.

Adult Small Groups:

- **The Sunday morning group** is studying the Old Testament history books of Ezra, Nehemiah, and Ester. We meet on Sundays at 8:45 am. Let Sheila Enstine know if you're interested.
- The Wednesday night Praise and Fellowship gathers at 7 pm with the praise team. After worship, we have a time of koinonia (sharing our faith) and prayer.
- The Thursday evening Bible Study begins at 7 pm. Pastor Ed is leading a study on the Gospel of Matthew.
- The Friday afternoon Women's Bible Study meets at 1:00 PM in the All Saints Room. During the summer months, this group will move to a monthly schedule. We plan on reading Phillip Keller's *Lessons from a Sheep Dog: A True Story of Transforming Love.* See Suzanne Walker for more information.

Nursery: The nursery is available every Sunday for babies and children through age five.

<u>Children's Church:</u> After the first set of music on Sundays, children ages 6 through 10 (about 5th grade) are welcome to attend Children's Church. There is always someone prepared with a lesson.

- **In-person Prayer**: We also offer an in-person prayer time in the Sanctuary on Saturday mornings at 8:00 am. This is an opportunity to petition the Lord for others and for ourselves without the distractions often encountered at home or on the road.

Administrative Council Meeting May 8, 2023

Worship – an Essential Pillar in the Life of Grace


In his classic work *Celebration of Discipline*, Richard Foster identifies worship as a "corporate" or communal discipline.

Before we go any further, let's clear up a misconception. Discipline is not synonymous with punishment. The word discipline comes from the same root word as disciple, which is a learner. Spiritual disciplines, therefore, are tools for disciples to learn about the life of grace. Worship is an essential tool or pillar in that life.

Like any discipline, we advance in our ability with practice. When learning to play an instrument or learning a new language, the student might attend a weekly class, but there is always the expectation that the learner will practice at home.

Foster explains that although worship is primarily communal, we need to prepare for the gathering together of worshippers by practicing personal worship during the week. He calls this "cultivating a holy expectancy".

We expect to hear God's voice in communal worship because we've learned to recognize his voice in private worship at home and in smaller groups during the week. Worshipping at



home privately, with family, or in small groups can include the same elements as Sunday worship, such as praise songs or hymns, silent contemplation on the nature of God, confession and repentance, Scripture reading, thanksgiving, and intercessory prayers.

There's no required format in personal worship or communal worship. Foster points out that neither the Old Testament nor the New Testament gives us a prescription for the order of worship. This is not to say that form and ritual aren't useful, it's just that form and ritual themselves do not guarantee passionate worship.

There are practical things each of us can do to prepare for Sunday's communal worship. One is to get to bed early on Saturday night so that you can get up early on Sunday morning, able to worship God with "all of your strength." You can use the extra time on Sunday morning to pray for the Holy Spirit's anointing on the pastor, worship leaders, and teachers.

When arriving at church, especially before entering the sanctuary, pause and reflect on the fact that you are entering sacred space. Have a sense of being gathered with other believers, a fellowship of Holy Spirit empowered worshippers – the body of Christ.

Foster's beautiful phrase for this gathering is, "a divine melting of our separateness". He uses the temple imagery of journeying from the outer court into the inner court and finally into the Holy of Holies.

The dynamic gathering of the saints, with their collective experiences of personal worship, produces spiritual fruit in each believer's life. Gathered worship enables us to hear God's call on our lives more clearly. This clarity, in turn, leads to greater obedience.

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We are chastened, challenged, and cleansed by the public reading of the Word of God. Listeners cannot help but hear, see, even feel Christ's desire to mold and shape our lives into His image. As Foster puts it, "To stand before the Holy one of eternity is to change!"

The author ends his chapter on worship with this fitting passage from Scripture:

"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, as you teach and admonish one another in all wisdom, and as you sing songs and hymns and spiritual songs with thanksgiving in your hearts to God" (Colossians 3:16).

By practicing Colossians 3:16 each day, each of us will be cultivating that "holy expectancy" that produces passionate worship at home and in the gathering together of the saints.


